Preface / Programme Note

In the present work I have aimed at a confrontation of two poetic expressions, one rising from the tortured soul of a schizophrenic: *Adolph Wölfl*, the other being that of a highly respected and famous poet: *Rainer Marie Rilke*.

The first movement, *Lullaby* („Wiigen-Lied“, in Adolph Wölfl’s typically sensual spelling) has many psychological aspects, and it is punctuated by strange, distant calls, reminiscent of those of a street vendor or those of a mother calling from way up in a tower block to her child way down in a narrow courtyard.

The second movement, *Spring Song* („Frühlings-Lied“, by Rilke) is the song of the happy child, the child in vital harmony: open, playful, sensually aware.

Funeral March with Attendant Minor Accident („Trauermarsch mit einem Unglücksfall“, by Wölfl), the third movement, repeats the musical themes of the first movement, but a male soloist, who does his best to sing after the fashion of his fellow singers, suffers some embarrassing frustrations.

Adolph Wölfl

Adolph Wölfl was born in 1864 in Switzerland. His parents were very poor (his father was a drunkard who would spend his earnings in local inns), and the five children who survived early childhood (Adolph and four brothers) were in fact brought up in parish child care. The unhappiness of his youth - he was lonely, poor, and an abomination to the fathers of any girls he might fall in love with - came to its sad climax when he was twice caught in (vain) attempts at sexual crime.

From 1895 until his death in 1930, Wölfl was detained in Waldau, an asylum for the mentally disturbed. He developed here a unique artistic ability, the intensity of which has impressed an increasing number of people. He drew, wrote, and decorated more than 20.000 pages, many of them of considerable size. As early as 1921, Walter Morgenthaler (psychiatrist and doctor, tending Wölfl the patient) published the volume „Ein Geisteskranker als Künstler“ („A Lunatic as an Artist“), dealing with the paintings and writings of Wölfl, and Rainer Maria Rilke, the eminent poet, was deeply moved by the artistic quality of the Wölfl works thus published.

WIE EIN KIND was the first work by Per Nørgård inspired by Adolph Wölfl. Other major works inspired by Wölfl are SYMPHONY NO. 4 (Indischer Roosengaarten und Chineesischer Hexensee) (1981-82), the chamber opera THE DIVINE CIRCUS (1982) and the choral work D’MONSTRANTZ VÖÖGELI (1985), for chamber choir and tape of birdsongs.
